Among the Bolshevik leadership during the first two decades of Soviet rule, the term popuchik, from the Russian for "fellow traveler", was used to identify bourgeois communist sympathizers, whose ideological commitment was considered too weak to be trusted. This article contributes a summary of a secret episode in the life of Ángel del Río, outstanding professor of Columbia University, as popuchik of the communist party of Spain and possible carrier for the communist internationalist movement during several years in the 1920's. The data concerning del Río's secret life was recovered in the personal archive of a U.S. communist agent by the name of James N.
