This paper studies the 'New Agriculture', a process that combines the scientific knowledge with new agriculture practices the farmer introduced. The result of this combination was the increase of the productivity in the 19th century. For the expansion of the 'New Agriculture' was necessary the agricultural research, the technical education, and the diffusion of the research results. These innovations generated an agricultural modernization that rose the food production required due to the population increase occurred by the first Industrial Revolution. The New Agriculture spread to Europe and USA. In the Latin American countries its spread occurred in the second half of the 19th century, especially to Chile, Brazil, and Argentina. The agronomist's participation and the other specialist of the farming agriculture was determinant for its implantation. State participation was also very important. In Venezuela, this process began in the last third of the 19th century, but the scarcity of agronomist obstructed its development. In this paper, this process is reconstructed by comparative analysis with the Latin American countries. We study the different experiences applied in Venezuela and we indicate the principal results and restriction

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
