In 1743 Robert Blair's poem The Grave, considered one of the pioneers of the Graveyard School of the English 18th century, was published, prompting the execution of engravings by William Blake for a later version in 1808. These aroused the interest of the German publisher Rudolph Ackermann, who acquired them a few years later and offered them to José Joaquín de Mora during his exile in London to create Meditaciones poéticas. This work was commissioned in 1826 for the Spanish-American readers and shares, in addition to the drawings, certain thematic, stylistic and religious aspects with Blair's text. This is an issue that critics have not fully resolved and which we will address in the following paper. We will analyse both compositions and propose, simultaneously, a comparative study that reveals the adaptation of the lines and the idea of the English poem in the Spanish version

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
