

## "Bar's closed": política y poética en el cine de Ford [

It is a paradox that cinema such as John Ford's, at the service of the dominant ideology of the Anglo-Saxon American Empire -democratic fundamentalism, morally puritanical and based on progressive liberalism- has given rise, nevertheless, and despite this servile drawback, to a substantial filmography of enormous poetic, aesthetic and, therefore, ethical value. Regarding this apparent contradiction, the present analysis focuses, by way of reference, on parts of the extraordinary classic film The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance, at the centre of which is the prohibition of alcohol consumption as a supposed 'fundamental law of democracy' emblematised in the phrase "The bar is closed". A reflection on both the political philosophy of Gustavo Bueno and the thoughts of Carl Schmitt is carried out, to finally compare the case of Ford with that of Eisenstein

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
