

Catástrofe, miedo y asombro.: testimonios de la erupción del volcán Cosigüina (Nicaragua), 1835 [

Objective: To analyze the eruption of the Cosigüina volcano in 1835 by relating the history of climate and the study of emotions in the interdisciplinary framework of environmental history, a pertinent angle to intertwine individual and collective experiences with the landscape. Methodology: In the light of recent historiographical perspectives, primary sources are examined, and elements are provided to broaden historical understanding of the extreme manifestations of nature and the responses of societies. At the same time, we contextualize the volcanological event that occurred in the state of Nicaragua in the context of the Little Ice Age and present the social framework of the Gulf of Fonseca where the stories were generated. Originality: Although the explosion of Cosigüina has been examined by volcanology using testimonies, the account of the events has not been problematized from historical research, to which we add with this article that also incorporates unpublished testimony. Conclusions: By establishing a dialogue between the histories of climate and emotions, focusing on fear and wonder at natural phenomena allows for creative reassessment in environmental history.

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
